On October 2, 2007, I was sworn in to represent the people in the Western Hills area on the council.

As a citizen, one of my greatest frustrations is how difficult it is to find out the facts or the information legislators are relying upon. Whenever a big issue hits there is always two opposing positions - both insisting they are right - even as they completely contradict each other. And most of the time we find out about legislation that has a tremendous effect on our daily lives after the fact.

The difficulty in finding real information is a barrier to the average person being able to fully participate in our government. But it's also possible to navigate. The Utah Legislature provides a very comprehensive web site which includes both audio and printed files. There are non-profit groups which devote their resources to making the process accessible. And there is the media.

If there is interest I will set a regular time for people to get together. We can talk about resources, managing and tracking information, or just chat about politics, issues and candidates. We will look at various committees, the process of drafting a bill, how a bill works its way through the legislature, and ways that citizens can express their views. If there is enough interest I can also schedule trainers to come in to provide more comprehensive information.

My goal is to welcome anyone who wishes to participate regardless of their level of involvement, citizenship status, ethnicity, religion, economic status, party affiliation, etc. There is, in my opinion, a severe gap in non-partisan resources for people to just get involved. If child care is an issue please let me know and perhaps I can arrange for some assistance.

The reality is that Kearns is a community made up from all of the people who live here or own property here. The Kearns Community Council is an advisory counsel, which means that it

Proposed Redevelopment Opportunities Report

Close your eyes - and imagine that you and your family are enjoying dinner at a nice new restaurant, going to a movie and patronizing one of several



new retail businesses located right here in Kearns. Yes, that's right, Kearns.

This could be a reality if zoning and redevelopment plans proceed as recommended in a recent study completed by Wikstrom and Associates for the Salt Lake County Redevelopment Agency. With only 76 vacant or under-utilized acres in Kearns available for development or redevelopment, the Salt Lake County Council identified several priority areas in Kearns for such to occur.

The SLCRA completed a Preliminary Area Analysis which include Priority Area 1 - Kearns Warehouse/Industrial Area (specifically Pipe and Tube property), Priority Area 2 - Commercial/Retail on the northwest and southwest corners of 5400 South and 4000 West Intersection, and lastly Priority Area 3 - Olympic Oval. The RDA approved Priority Area 1 for additional study, and has hired consultant Richard Chong of Richard Chong and Associates to assess the highest and best use of the vacant and under-utilized areas.

The KCC Economic Development Committee has facilitated two recent

meetings with residents and land and business owners to gain input on whether they support a request from Jay and Dave Anderson to change the zoning on their property, better known as Pipe and Tube. The Anderson's zoning request actual gets the ball rolling on SLCRA's proposed development and redevelopment of several areas. The Andersons are requesting a change from M-1 (light manufacturing/industrial) to C-2 (commercial/retail) for their property located on the Southeast corner of the 4700 South 5600 West intersection.

In these recent meetings, Richard (Chong and Associates) outlined the current use and several "conceptual" renderings of what could be developed in the Priority Area 1. These include:

- Changing the zoning of Pipe and Tube from M-1 to C-2 which would allow Commercial and Retail development on the Pipe and Tube property
- Changing the use of the remaining Warehouse/Industrial area from M-1 to RM, this would create opportunities for Commercial/Retail Development and Residential PUD and throughout that area.
- Other renderings included zoning changes to the Pipe and Tube property only and leaving the remaining Warehouse/Industrial area M-1 (Light manufacturing).

Over the last two years, the KCC EDC has facilitated several meetings to garner input on current and future development and redevelopment opportunities in our area. These initially started out as meetings with land and business owners in the Kearns Warehouse/Industrial Area bordering 5600 West and 4700 South. They primarily structured to better understand infrastructure needs and issues that have plagued the Kearns

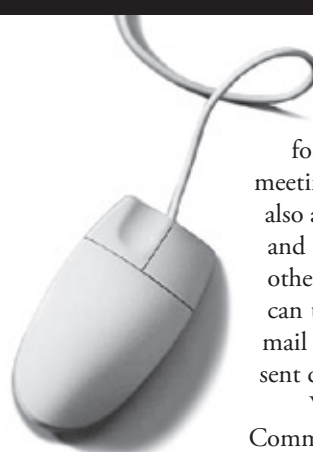

I have been asked to introduce three Cops working in the Kearns area. Over the past few months we have undergone some changes, this includes your COP representative and the Command Staff for the Kearns Precinct itself.

In August, **Deputy Richard Wilson** was assigned to the COP Unit. He is familiar with Kearns area as he has worked patrol in the Kearns/Magna Precincts for the past five years. The past two and a half years he has been a member of the Salt Lake County SWAT team. There he is assigned as a sniper/marksman.

Lt. Robby Russo is a twenty-four year veteran of the Sheriff's Department. He brings a lot of experience and knowledge to the Precinct. His experience includes working with DEA, East Patrol, Auto Theft, Unsolved Homicide Unit, Organized Crime Unit, and as Cottonwood Heights City Chief. He has attended both Westminster College and the University of Utah.

Capt. Teri Sommers is a twenty-three year veteran of the Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff's Department initially hired her in 1984 as a Corrections Officer; she was hired on as a Deputy in 1987. Neighbor to Neighbor a Success

The Salt Lake County Mayor's Office recently launched a new program called Neighbor to Neighbor during the month of September. The project was centered on a week-long intensive effort to clean up and repair neighborhoods that are in need of extra help. For the project launch, 231 homes were selected from the Western Hills neighborhood to participate.

Some of the specific activities included removing weeds from parking strips, repairing and replacing street and road signs, striping crosswalks, street sweeping, curbside junk removal, and repairing sidewalk trip hazards. In conjunction with the Kearns Community Council, Salt Lake County hosted a block party at the end of the week to wrap up the project. Animal Services was on site to provide rabies shots, vaccinations, and pet licensing. The Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office, Mayor Corroon and staff, and the KCC were also on hand to talk with residents.

Next year, the County is expecting to host as many as three projects in different townships. Salt Lake County would like to provide a hearty thank you to the KCC, volunteers, and residents for their participation and support of the project.

Three Major Issues To Affect Kearns

The Survey is coming... What will you choose?

During the spring of 2008, you may get a call asking you questions about what type of government you want for Kearns. Do you stay part of the unincorporated county; do you request to be annexed by West Valley or Taylorsville; or, would you like to become a city?

In their attempt to find out whether the current township law that protects the boundaries and services of Kearns should be allowed to continue, the State Legislature mandated the cities and county survey the residents of the unincorporated areas to see what their feelings were on the issue. The legislation was called HB 40.

So you can make an informed choice, you will be receiving information about each of the options, and what are available to the residents of Kearns. If you have additional questions, there will be an HB 40 link on the county website at slco.org.

The Granite School District Split

Although it didn't make it to the ballot this year, the proposed split of the Granite School District could be back in play again next year. The Kearns Community Council, in conjunction with the Copperton Community Council, White City Community Council, Magna Community Council and Magna Town Council, oppose the division of the school district under the current law due

to the fact the division procedure cannot guarantee our children and their educational opportunities are held harmless.

The Mountain View Corridor and East-West Transportation Study

With the continued growth along the west side of the valley, getting to and from work has become more and more of a challenge for all of us. To try to stem the tide of increased travel times, UDOT has finally completed the Draft Environmental Impact Study for the Mountain View Corridor, and started the East-West Transportation Study.

This has been a 5-year study to find an alignment for a new freeway along the west side of the valley. The Draft Environmental Impact Statement outlines the proposed and preferred alignments. It also discusses the option of having a toll fund the road. It has been a position of the Kearns Community Council, Magna Community Council, Copperton Community Council and the cities of the west side to oppose the road being a toll road. The public comment period is on now. You can voice your supports and/or concerns online at Utah.gov. Just click on the links for the Mountain View Corridor Study.

The East-West Transportation Study will look at coming up with transportation system designs that can help us move across the valley, not just North South. It will look at road and transit together to figure out how to more effectively move people in a timely manner.

This group meets again in January to look at a series of transportation options for the west side of the valley. They will be coming forward for their public comment period in late spring 2008.

Neighbor to Neighbor Project

We would appreciate your feedback on the Neighbor to Neighbor project that occurred on September 22nd. Salt Lake County Public Works did a lot of work in the area by smoothing down sidewalks, replacing old signs and installing new ones, and other improvement projects. Now that a little time has passed we would like to hear your comments about the project.

New Lighting

By the time this is printed, Salt Lake County should be in the process of installing 15 new street lights on the east side of Kearns.

Ed Mayne Street

Salt Lake County has agreed to do a traffic study to explore the possibility of extending Ed Mayne Street on the Master Plan. Currently, people using Oquirrh Park encounter a fair amount of delay trying to exit on to Cougar Lane following events. Additionally, if an emergency occurred the only directions for traffic to flow to clear the area would be North and South on Cougar Lane.

5600 West Beautification

We are still in the process of petitioning both UDOT and Salt Lake County, in cooperation with Kearns Improvement District, to improve the appearance of the east side of 5600 West in Kearns. The team is almost set, the vision is shared, and now it's time to find the money. In or-

der to ensure continuity, the Kearns Community Council member on this project will continue to be Chuck McDowell.

UTA

It wasn't very long ago that UTA did some major revisions on their routes. Please let us know how that is working for you.

There are a couple of other active projects that the Public Works Committee has been working on. Unfortunately, I haven't had the chance to meet with the whole committee, so I'll have to update you on the rest of our projects next time.

Recently, a member of the community emailed us to let us know about a couple of street lights that hadn't worked for a couple of months. Because he had included the location of those lights, Salt Lake County was able to have them repaired within days.
